

of his after course. But he requited them ill for he proued after a littler enimie unto them upon all occasion; and never repayed them any thing for it, to this day, but reproches and scull words. yet he diuulged it to some, that were none of their best freinds, whiche he yet had y^e bauer in his boat; that he could now set them all together by y^e ears, because they had done more then they could answer in letting him haue this beauer, and he did not spare to doe what he could, but his malice could not prevail.

All this whille no supply was heard of, neither knew they when they might expecte any. so they began to think how they might raise as much corne as they could, and obtaine a better croppe then they had done, that they might still thus languish in miserie. At length after much debate of things, the gouernor with y^e aduise of y^e cheefest amongst them gaue way that they should set corne every man for his owne particular, and in that regard trust to them selues; in all other things to god on in y^e general way as before. And so assigned to every family a parcell of land, according to the proportion of their number for that end, only for present uses, but made no division for inheritance, and ranged all boys, & youth under some familie. This had very good success; for it made all hands very iudicious. So as much more corne was planted, then other wais would haue done; by any means y^e gouernor or any other could use, and saved him a great deal of trouble, and gaue farr better contente: the women now wente willingly into y^e field, and tooke their litters with them to set corne; which before would aldy weake, and i[n]abilitie, whom to haue compellec[t] would haue bene thought great tirannie, and oppression.

The experiance that was had in this commone course, and condition, tried sundrie years, and that amongst godly, and sober men, may well euince, the vanitie of that conceite, of platos, & other ancients, ayaulded by some of later times. That y^e taking away of propertie, and bring^{ing} in communite, into a commone wealth, would make them happy, and florishing; as if they were wiser then god. for this communite, (so farr as it was) was found to breed much confusione, & discontent, and retard much employmet, that would haue bene to their bonifite, and comforte. for y^e young men that were most able and fitte for labours, & seruices, did repine that they shoulde spend their time, & strenght to work for other mens wiues, and children, without any recompence. The strong, or man of parts, had no more in deuision of victuals, & cloathes, then he that was weak, and not able to doe a quarter y^e other could, this was thought injustice.
